### 2023 68th ANNUAL FALL HARVEST SHOW A STANDARD SHOW OPEN TO ALL

#### **RULES:**

- In the Horticulture Division more than one entry may be made in any specimen class
  provided each entry is of a different variety. The judges may form new classes as
  required. If three or more entries of one variety are made in one class, they will
  automatically constitute a separate class.
- 2. All entries in the Horticulture Division must be grown by the exhibitor and must be labeled as to kind and variety to compete for awards.
- 3. Containers will be supplied by the show management for the Horticulture Division.
- 4. Entries must be checked with the Classification Committee together with an entry tag which is to be filled out completely by the exhibitor before the entries are placed.
- 5. Entries close promptly at 11:00 am Saturday, August 26. Entries or awards are **not to be removed before 5:00 pm Sunday, August 27.**
- 6. The show management reserves the right to move arrangements if necessary.
- Containers and accessories must be clearly marked with the exhibitor's name. The show
  management will exercise extreme care, but cannot be responsible for loss or damage to
  exhibitor's property.
- 8. Artistic Arrangement rules are found under Division IV.
- No person except the judges and assistants will be allowed in the show rooms while judging is in progress.
- 10. All entries must conform to quantity and condition as prescribed in the class description.
- 11. Ribbons and entry tags are to be taken at the close of the show. If not claimed they will be returned to Kingwood.
- 12. Unnamed varieties in any class may compete for ribbons only. All unnamed varieties must be entered in the "Unnamed Variety" category.

#### SPECIAL CLASS

"DINNER BEFORE THE SYMPHONY" – An **Exhibition Table** picture, type 1, staged in a space 30" deep, 34" style and formality. \*

#### NOTE 9

- \*EXHIBITION TABLE Exhibition table pictures are only found in flower shows. They have nothing to do with the service of food. They are an art endeavor. Select the components used in meal service. The items can be creatively placed, e.g. a plate on a stand, a napkin hanging on a background, even a cup on its side. Components may be staged in an open frame with an unusual background. Type 1 must include a completed floral design. Fabric should have a 12" drop in front. All components should be harmonious in color, texture, style and formality.
- \*CONCERT HALL A construction is an abstract 3-dimensional design using 3 or more related containers with plant materials and components. (a) use single related containers with partial or completed designs. Use one type of line material, one type foliage and one type of flower. Design containers can differ or even be empty. (b) single containers are connected after being placed. Line material is used so it moves from container to container as a continuing defined pattern of line. Add plant material as suggested in (a).
- \*ENSEMBLE A synergistic design is an abstract 3-dimensional design using 3 or more related containers with plant materials and components. (a) use single related containers with partial or completed designs. Use one type of line material, one type foliage and one type of flower. Design containers can differ or even be empty. (b) single containers are connected after being placed. Line material is used so it moves from container to container as a continuing defined pattern of line. Add Plant material as suggest in (a).
- \*CENTER STAGE An illuminary is a 3-dimensional creative design which incorporates lights as one of the components. Lighting must be an integral part. Special lighting wires and batteries must be concealed to be integrated. Conceal lights in the base, a container or in the background. Spotlights do not conform to the description. The design may or may not be abstract. In our show battery-operated lights must be used

#### SECTION Z. JUNIOR ARTISTIC DESIGN

JUNIOR CLASSES: (71 to 72) A = ages 9 years and under...B = ages 10 and above OR

Juniors may enter any class (60 to 70). Add "J" and age on entry tag.

- 71. "Maestro's Wand" a vertical design
- 72. "Percussion Section" an arrangement in a round container

# ARTISTIC DESIGN RULES FOR BOTH ADULT AND JUNIOR CLASSES

- 1. An exhibitor is limited to one entry in each titled artistic class.
- 2. Material used in each class does not have to be grown by the designer.
- 3. Some plant material must be used in all designs.
- 4. Artificial plant materials are not permitted.
- 5. Dried material may be used...the dried materials may be treated or painted.
- 6. Fruit and vegetables which might be used cannot be cut open.
- 7. Fresh material cannot be painted.
- 8. Use the dimension defined for each class.
- 9. Backgrounds may be used and are to be provided by the designer.
